



Cardboard

- clean, dry and flattened cardboard
- corrugated cardboard boxes
- boxboard, i.e. cereal, detergent, product boxes, food item boxes such as cereal, crackers, beer, pasta, etc.
- toilet paper rolls and paper towel rolls
- pressboard i.e. egg cartons and packing forms
- waxed cardboard boxes

Garbage: padded envelopes, carbon paper, elastic bands, paper clips, plastic liners and plasticized or waxy papers.



Food Waste

- raw and cooked vegetables
- pits, peelings, rinds, cores, husks and tops
- pumpkins, tomatoes, squash, popcorn, potato chips, etc.
- raw and cooked fruits
- pineapples, bananas, apples, oranges, mangos, pears etc.
- rice, breads, cereal, noodles, toast, tortillas, baked goods, pastries, pies, etc.
- coffee grounds and filters
- tea bags and leaves
- cheese
- paper soiled with food i.e. napkins, paper towel
- wax
- eggshells
- popsicle and stir sticks (wooden only)
- plate scrapings
- cooled ashes in a paper bag

Garbage: bones, elastics, twist ties, stickers, plastic labels, straws, condiments packets, foil wrappers. Please note disposable foodware products are not acceptable at this time.



GARBAGE

Garbage

If it can not be recycled in Banff and it is not hazardous waste, it is garbage and can be thrown out.

Please help us by placing only currently acceptable food items in the food bins. If we find that your food bin contains a lot of waste that is not acceptable, the contents will have to be handled as garbage and charged out at the appropriate rate. A notice will be placed on your food bin to indicate that the contents have been rejected from the food route and will be emptied on the next available garbage route.



Create a space. Sort the waste. Divert it to the right place.



Collect Recyclables and bring them to:

- Downtown Depot - 200 block of Beaver Street
- Compound Depot - 120 Hawk Avenue
- Operations Compound - Schedule a drop off at 120 Hawk Avenue



Glass Bottles & Jars

- we accept all glass jars and bottles
- you don't have to worry about removing labels, but jars should be clean and lids removed

Garbage: window panes or windshields, ceramic materials, cookware and tableware.



Metal food cans

- fruit cups, ribbed food cans, aerosol cans and other small pieces of metal such as pie plates and foil lids
- you don't have to worry about removing labels, but cans should be clean
- to minimize cuts and lost lids, it's best to put the lid into the can and press it shut
- Buffet Fuel Cans only if completely empty (unemptied should be held until one of the annual household hazardous waste roundups).



Plastics

- plastic bottles, plastic food jars, plastic containers and plastic tubs with a Mobius Loop and number 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 & 7
- Mobius Loop example:



- margarine, ice cream, yogurt; ketchup, shampoo, foodwear shells, jugs, non-drink containers & bottles.
- remove lids and rinse
- plastic bags are accepted at Banff grocery stores.

Garbage: plastic containers without a Mobius Loop, foamed plastic, such as packing forms and peanuts, single serving condiment containers such as cream, jam, butter, drink ornaments, polystyrene, soiled items, non-beverage Tetra Paks, plastic film, plastic wrap, packaging and food wrappers.

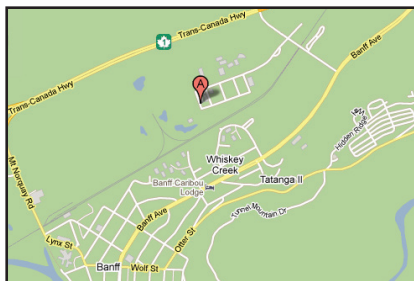


Mixed Papers

- clean and dry newspaper
- advertising inserts
- brown paper grocery bags
- clean dry paper (it's okay to leave staples in)
- white or coloured paper
- photocopies
- receipts
- windowed envelopes
- envelopes (without padding)
- file folders
- fax paper
- Post-It™ notes
- shredded office paper contained in a paper bag
- photocopy paper wrapping (ream wrap)
- magazines
- gift wrap
- glossy fax paper
- glossy flyers and brochures
- catalogues
- phone books
- soft cover and paper back books
- junk mail

Garbage: padded envelopes, carbon paper, elastic bands, paper clips, metal fasteners, plastic liners and plasticized or waxy papers.

Bring to the Banff Bottle Depot: Refundable Drink Containers



Most ready-to-serve beverage containers can be returned to the bottle depot for a refund. These include beverages sold in a bottle, can, pouch or carton made of: glass, metal, plastic (including milk), foil and aluminum, paper (bag-in-a-box i.e. wine or juice), tetra-brik (drink boxes), waxed paperboard (i.e. soy/rice milk, orange juice, milk)
