That the Governance and Finance Committee direct Administration:

- 1) On whether to return with new smoking regulations that would restrict the smoking or vaping of tobacco in public outdoor spaces beyond what is currently identified in the provincial legislation and provide Administration with a list of proposed locations to include (as per page 4 of the report);
- 2) On whether to return with changes to the existing cannabis smoking/vaping regulation that currently limits this activity to private property; and
- 3) To forgo pursuing information related to the design and installation of smoking pavilions within the townsite.

BACKGROUND

Reason for Report

At the June 22, 2020, meeting of Governance and Finance, Administration was directed to return with a report to consider public smoking regulation changes in Banff after the Province had adopted amendments to the *Tobacco, Smoking and Vaping Reduction Act*. This Act was amended on July 31, 2021, and included additional restrictions where tobacco could be smoked or vaped in public.

With the new provincial legislation in place, Administration is returning to seek direction from Governance and Finance regarding:

- Current regulations pertaining to the smoking/vaping of tobacco in Banff;
- The current cannabis smoking regulations in Banff; and
- The concept of ventilated smoking pavilions within the townsite.

Summary of Issue

In June of 2018, Council adopted Bylaw 396 Streets and Public Places Use – Amendment No. 4 that would prohibit the public smoking or vaping of cannabis within the townsite once it became legal in the fall of 2018. This was done as per the public health recommendations that were provided by Alberta Health Services and based on similar approaches being undertaken in other municipalities in our region, including the City of Calgary.

During that discussion, the public smoking of tobacco was also raised as a topic for further deliberation in order to further mitigate the negative health effects and nuisance of second-hand smoke. In fall of 2018, Council directed Administration to pursue consultation with the public prior to contemplating any further public smoking changes. A decision was made to combine this

consultation with the public check-in that had been committed to at the one-year mark of cannabis legalization and so a public smoking survey was conducted between October 2019 and February 2020 to seek opinions on tobacco and cannabis smoking/vaping regulations in the Town of Banff. The results of this survey were shared at the Governance and Finance meeting on June 22, 2020, at which time the committee directed Administration to hold off on returning with any further reports until the province had passed an amended *Tobacco, Smoking and Vaping Reduction Act*.

Town of Banff Public Smoking Survey Findings

The findings from the Banff Public Smoking survey demonstrated wide polarization among smokers and non-smokers on the topic of smoking in public. The survey was completed by 508 individuals, 44% of whom smoked or vaped. As noted at the time, the Alberta Health Services smoking statistic for the Calgary health zone cites that 11.7% of the population smoke tobacco, and 16.9% smoke cannabis. When the report findings were shared it was noted that one of the limitations to on-line surveys is there can be a strong self-selection bias which can skew overall findings. As a result, the survey results were broken down to include the results from smokers and non-smokers and compared to all respondents.

There was some consensus among smokers and non-smokers in terms of areas where the smoking of tobacco should be prohibited and included locations such as playgrounds, and outdoor skating rinks. However other areas saw a large disparity of opinion such as in the recreation grounds picnic areas where 69% of non-smokers felt smoking should be banned in this location, as compared to only 17-30% of smokers/vapers who felt the same way. As another example, 73% of non-smokers felt smoking should be banned at the Skatepark, while only 28-35% of smokers felt this should be the case.

The area of greatest agreement was with respect to the smoking of cannabis in people's backyards – 68% of non-smokers felt this should continue to be permitted, with 100% of smokers agreeing with this. In summary, there was a significant difference of opinion with respect to public smoking options overall, and not surprisingly, those who smoke tend to want more public options to do so, and those who don't smoke would like to see less options available. Organizations such as ASH (Action on Smoking and Health) and Alberta Health Services, both of whom have addressed Council as delegations over the last few years align with the non-smoker perspective, as both have mandates to reduce and prevent smoking for health advocacy reasons and to reduce the normalization of smoking activity in the public realm, especially for children and youth.

At the June 22, 2020, meeting of Governance and Finance after the results of the Public Smoking Survey were shared, there was no direction given to Administration to change the existing cannabis public smoking/vaping rules. Some of the commentary made by members of committee that day was that the issue of limiting the smoking or vaping of cannabis to private property had not been identified as a significant problem by constituents, and so did not see a need to make any changes as a result at that time.

Updated Provincial Tobacco Smoking and Vaping Legislation

The Province of Alberta undertook a review of its tobacco smoking and vaping regulations in 2020/21 in order to reduce the health harms associated with smoking and second-hand smoke, and to address the rise in youth vaping.

The following restrictions were added to strengthen the previous provincial legislation and are now in effect in Banff and enforced through the *Tobacco, Smoking and Vaping Reduction Act*:

- The sale of flavoured vaping products is prohibited;
- The sale of tobacco or vaping products is prohibited for sale from a vending machine or at any temporary or mobile outlets or premises; and
- Smoking and vaping is now prohibited in additional places as per the table below:

According to ASH, the provincial smoking restrictions added to the legislation were welcomed, however the organization would have liked to see it go even farther. When ASH presented to Council as a delegation on Monday, November 22nd, 2021, some statistics specific to the impacts of tobacco on health were shared which included:

Smoking facts:

- The use of tobacco compromises quality of life;
- Tobacco use causes 50,000 deaths each year in Canada and is the cause of 20% of all deaths in Canada, with an additional 1 million people suffering from the health effects of tobacco;
- 1 in 2 smokers will die prematurely;
- Second-hand smoke kills 1000 people annually in Canada – there is no safe level of exposure; and
- Tobacco products contain thousands of chemicals and dozens of known carcinogens.

Vaping facts:

- In 2019, over 400,000 Canadian youth had vaped in the last 30 days;
- Youth who vape are at least 3 times more likely to start smoking tobacco;
- One adult stops cigarette smoking by vaping for every 80 youth vapers who start smoking; and
- Almost 100% of youth started vaping using flavoured products.

Some municipalities have adopted stronger public smoking legislation, including additional public smoking restrictions in all parks, on trails/sidewalks, beaches, outdoor markets, outdoor events, and have included restrictions around smoking in hotel rooms, as well as the addition of business licensing fees for the sale of tobacco, as was done for retailers of cannabis. The table in Attachment 1 depicts a list of municipalities who have smoking bylaws in place that include additional restrictions to the current *Tobacco, Smoking and Vaping Reduction Act*. The decisions taken by municipalities in Alberta to further restrict smoking in public areas such as parks, trails and outdoor events and markets is in line with an increasing number of cities around the world who are introducing smoke free regulations in an effort to respond to the dangers posed by smoking and second hand smoke. In January of 2021, the City of Milan introduced an extensive outdoor smoking ban in public places to help improve air quality as they had identified that cigarette smoke was responsible for approximately 8% of the city's inhalable particulate matter (PM10). It is believed to be one of the first cities to link smoking restrictions with improving air quality.

The intention behind limiting opportunities to smoke in public places is to reduce the opportunity for youth to see social modelling of smoking in public, to promote healthy communities, to protect at risk populations, and ultimately to protect overall public health.

Tobacco Smoking/Vaping Restriction Location Options for Consideration in Banff

As other municipalities have done as per the list in Attachment 1, the following could be considered as additional areas to restrict the smoking or vaping of tobacco to further enhance Banff's public smoking regulations:

- Municipal parks/parkettes/green spaces;
- Trails/Pathways;
- Outdoor markets;
- Outdoor events;
- Smoking rooms/floors in hotels;
- Outdoor bus stops (not considered shelters);
- Public sidewalks/pedestrian zones;
- Smoking in proximity to children not in one's custody, care or control; and
- Increasing the distance from a doorway, window or air intake from the provincially stated 5 metres.

Note: Any proposed changes to the existing smoking regulations specific to restrictions on the smoking of tobacco should include an exemption for tobacco use for traditional ceremonial purposes.

Smoking Pavilions– Administration also aims to seek direction from Governance and Finance on a motion that was passed that directed Administration to do further work with respect to pursuing the concept of smoking pavilions within the town site (COU 18-57). Action on this direction was delayed until the public smoking survey was completed, and then again until the updated provincial legislation specific to tobacco smoking and vaping were made. During a discussion of Council prior to the public smoking survey being issued, Council discussed the potential for the design and construction of ventilated smoking pavilions in Banff to try to mitigate the nuisance of second-hand smoke.

Administration has attempted to seek information on this topic, and although there are some examples of smoking shelters that can be found for purchase by vendors (most likely for locating on private commercial property), the majority are intended to protect smokers from the elements of weather and don't offer any ventilated options. Administration was able to find an example of a free-standing structures ("smoking cabin") that could accommodate up to six people with a roof exhaust system, however it appears that the smoke is just released outside.

Were the Town to pursue such an initiative, it is likely that a customized option would be needed given the requirements in the Banff Design Guidelines, and the siting of one or more of these amenities would likely be very challenging given the limited footprint within the townsite. As a result, Administration does not recommend pursuing this tactic. It also likely works against the public health goal to not normalize the act of smoking. Investing and building dedicated municipal infrastructure for smoking in public likely has the opposite effect to the public health goals of reducing the prevalence of smoking in communities.

Response Options

1. Direct Administration to return with draft regulations would further restrict the smoking or vaping of tobacco in public outdoor spaces beyond what is currently identified in the provincial legislation and provide Administration with a list of proposed locations to include (as per page 4 of the report);
2. Direct Administration to return with amendments to the current cannabis smoking regulations in Banff that would lessen the current restrictions around public smoking of cannabis;
3. Direct Administration to forgo pursuing information related to the design and installation of smoking pavilions within the townsite;
4. Direct Administration to return with further information about smoking pavilions, their design, cost and where to place them; and
5. Receive this report as information and take no further action at this time on Banff's public smoking or vaping regulations, leaving all regulations as they currently are.

IMPLICATIONS OF DECISION

Budget

Should smoking regulations be changed, some new signage would be required. The cost of this would depend on the extent of the restrictions put in place. Administration could provide a more accurate picture of the signage costs once further direction is provided in terms of which areas within the townsite (if any), are being considered for smoking restrictions.

Internal Resources

Should Administration be directed to draft new smoking regulations, staff from Community Services, Municipal Enforcement, and the Municipal Clerk's office would be involved.

Communication

Should changes be made to Banff's smoking regulations, there will need to be targeted communication to a variety of stakeholders including BLLT, BLLHA, as well as to residents and visitors of Banff. A similar strategy would likely be undertaken as was done when cannabis regulations came into effect.

Legislation/Policy

Banff rescinded its Smoking Bylaw after the Province of Alberta's *Tobacco and Smoking Reduction Act* took effect on January 1, 2006. Ever since that time, Banff's tobacco smoking regulations have aligned with the provincial act. However, when the Cannabis Act was adopted by the province in 2019, it permitted the public consumption of cannabis in some areas, and the municipality opted to further restrict the smoking of cannabis and limit it to private property only.

The Town of Banff *Streets and Public Places Bylaw* is the current policy document that depicts additional restrictive measures tied to the smoking or vaping of cannabis. This document could be used to speak to any changes made to the smoking or vaping of tobacco that deviates from the provincial Tobacco, Smoking and Vaping Reduction Act. Alternatively, a Smoking Bylaw could also be drafted and adopted specific to the topic of smoking.
